We are working through these Lutheran connections to provide malaria prevention, education and treatment for people who are vulnerable to this curable disease.

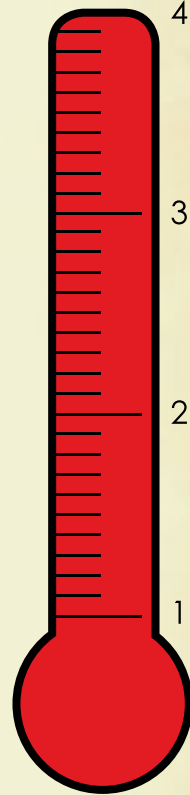
Thank you for your generosity and commitment to this work.

PRAY for those affected by malaria. Look for prayers, litanies and suggested hymns specifically designed for World Malaria Day at www.ELCA.org/malaria.

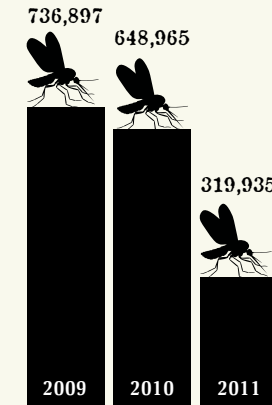

Spotlight on: ZIMBABWE



Since 2009, cases of malaria in Zimbabwe have been cut in half! Your gifts have helped make a difference.



PREVENTION – EDUCATION – TREATMENT

- Household inspections are performed to check on effective hanging, maintenance and use of nets
- Community leaders are trained in malaria prevention and control – educating others through home visits, song, dance and drama
- Leaders educating communities about malaria are equipped with bicycles to help with transportation challenges
- Advocacy workshops educate community leaders about the malaria resources that are available in their area
- 26,000 people will directly benefit from Lutheran malaria programming

SUCCESS

- Burure elementary school, with 1,000 students, had five to seven children die each year from malaria. Since malaria programming was implemented, there have been no reported deaths from malaria among their students.
- Education around spraying insecticides has improved – where people once refused this preventative treatment, they now welcome it.

MEET MARIA

In Mozambique, a Lutheran congregation took action against malaria.

With the support of the ELCA Malaria Campaign and our companion church's malaria project, 34 leaders from seven area churches gathered to learn how to help neighbors prevent and treat malaria.

For two days, the leaders learned together about how the disease is transmitted, how to prevent infection, and how and when to seek treatment.

And most importantly they learned how to pass on this vital information to educate others. At the end of the two-day training, they all took what they learned into action.

Mosquito nets were not only distributed – but education on how to use the nets also took place.

Maria Jose was delighted to receive a net that day from the Rev. Eduardo Sinalo (pictured).

In the less than two years since the ELCA Malaria Campaign joined the global movement to fight malaria, the number of deaths from this disease has been reduced.

Working with local congregations, global companions, ecumenical partners and trained leaders we achieve more together than we ever could alone. And your generosity is the spark that makes it happen.
