SITUATION

The El Niño coastal phenomenon, triggered by the increase in sea surface temperature, caused major rain storms in northern Peru between February and March 2017. The UN reported that nearly two million people were affected by the flooding that followed, almost 300,000 of those were severely impacted.

In Piura, which is in the northwest region of Peru and one of the hardest hit areas, about 336,000 people were impacted. The UN also reported that about 75,000 homes were impacted and 8,600 of those were either destroyed or uninhabitable. Displaced persons were had to go to shelters or tents.



RESPONSE

Lutheran Disaster Response, in partnership with La Iglesia Luterana del Perú (The Lutheran Church in Peru or IL-P), accompanied the communities of Piura, Chiclayo, Trujillo.

With support from LDR, IL-P implemented a project that addressed some of the extreme housing needs of vulnerable individuals and families by providing construction materials for families to self repair damaged homes. The support went for items such as; adobes, roofing sheets, battens, cement, sand, gravel, stone, and other supplies.

Shortly after Hurricane Harvey struck in late August 2017, The Presiding Pastor/ President of IL-P reached out to their companion Synod, TX-LA Gulf Coast Synod to share these words:
