Commissioning and welcoming litanies

Congregations have supported their youth in preparing for the Gathering in Detroit. Soon it will be time to send them on their way as we Rise Up Together! The Gathering team has provided a congregational blessing and sending for congregations to use in worship July 5 or July 12 to commission your Gathering participants to go to Detroit to live out their baptismal call. Getting ready for Ford Field

Ford Field will be open to all participants at 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday through Saturday. Entry will be through Gates A, B, C, D, F and G. Security will check all participants' bags as they enter the location. No food or beverages are permitted to be brought into Ford Field (water bottles and food required for medical reasons will be allowed). Seating is on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is highly recommended that groups enter Ford Field together as there is no reserved seating or saving of seats. Access to the main floor seating will be through staircases at the end of designated aisles. Once the floor has been filled to the capacity, no additional participants will be permitted. Participants seated on the floor will be issued a wristband that will allow them to leave the floor to use the restrooms and concessions and return to their seats. Concessions will be open from 5:30 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. for food and beverage purchases. Please note that concessions close promptly at 7:30 p.m. when the house band begins, even if there are still people in line. On Sunday, Ford Field will open at 8:30 a.m. for closing worship. Concessions will not be open on Sunday.

Bag storage downtown

The Community Life Team will provide bag storage Wednesday, July 15, through Saturday, July 18, at the Cobo Center. Each congregational group can check one bag (up to the size of a carry-on suitcase). Bags must be picked up by 11 p.m. each day or they will not be able to be accessed until the Gathering activities at Cobo begin the next day (you may not want to put your hotel or car keys in the bag). A reminder that bags larger than a backpack will not be allowed in Ford Field.

For Sunday, July 19, the Gathering has made arrangements for participants using the TMS airport service to store their luggage at the Cobo Center in Hall E

Diapers for Detroiters

On average a newborn goes through eight to 10 diapers a day, a cost that can add up to \$100 a month for one baby. For people who are poor that cost is out of reach. Too often they have to choose between diapers and food. To help families with children, one of the in-kind items the Gathering is collecting for Detroit is diapers — lots and lots of diapers.

Starfish Family Services, a Gathering partner, will work with Detroit-area agencies to make sure the diapers are distributed to agencies that serve children. The impact of this collection will hopefully continue well after the Gathering. Pam Lincoln from Starfish, who is helping organize the diaper project, said, "Because of the ELCA, community members have decided to resurrect the Detroit Diaper Bank. Your event will jump-start that initiative!"

The Metro Detroit Diaper Bank will house the diapers so babies can be healthy for months after the collection. The hope is that the Gathering's efforts will create a spark in the community for people to continue donating diapers to share with Detroiters. As you are getting ready for the Gathering, remember to bring diapers!

After you've made, played with and learned this peacemaking discipline you'll be ready to take your Peace Puppet out into the world!

For years the New Jersey Synod has been engaged in a remarkable peacemaking ministry in Bosnia and Herzegovina, a country still desperately trying to recover from a war that divided the people along ethnic lines. The Peace Puppets we are bringing to the Detroit Gathering have been used all over Bosnia and Herzegovina with children, teens and adults seeking to build a peaceful, diverse country and world! Banners in Ford Field

Congregations are invited to hang banners in Ford Field throughout the Gathering. Since these banners are meant to show our identity as one particular representation of Christ's body, they must not be in poor taste, offensive or include profanity. Banners should not obstruct the view of other guests, cover stadium signage or inhibit walkways. Banners of a commercial nature are also not permitted without specific permission of building management. Banners should be no larger than 3-foot-by-5-foot (portrait orientation) and will be hung with your own plastic zip ties at the base of the plaza level over the wall leading to the floor. Immediately after Sunday's worship service, banners need to be removed or they will be discarded.
