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

MISSIONARIES AND GLOBAL CHURCH

In March 2020, the ELCA asked all mission personnel to either return to the United States or shelter in place. Most missionaries chose to shelter in place with their communities. For example, Dr. Steve Swanson and Jodi Swanson continued their work in Lutheran hospitals in Arusha, Tanzania, for several months before returning to the United States in July. They worked to provide medical staff with the personal protective equipment they need, sourcing locally made masks and hand sanitizer from a nearby craft beer maker.

Missionaries who returned to the United States have also found ways to continue their missions. From Columbus, Ohio, Mark and Cynthia Holder Rich are teaching students in Arusha online. While Christie Manisto and Steven Saari spent several months in Minneapolis, Minn., they remained connected with partners in Cairo, Egypt, through weekly online worship. They have recently been able to return to Cairo.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN LEADERS

The International Women Leaders program (IWL) offered five new awards for incoming scholars to study at ELCA colleges and universities. This incoming class includes two college/university partners and four companion churches that are new to the IWL program. This summer, we have had to navigate the constantly changing implications of the pandemic for international students. Most U.S. embassies and consulates around the world remain closed for visa interviews, so some of our incoming students will defer their program starts. We are fortunate that two incoming IWL students received their visas in time to begin classes in person this fall. We hope the rest will begin their studies in the spring semester. In the meantime, we welcome them to the IWL community.

The 2020 Global Leadership Academy has been postponed until late 2021. The event will still be held in Palestine in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. And it will still provide women leaders from companions around the world a chance to gather, learn and build relationships. All of this will be possible because of your gracious gifts.

UPCOMING TRIPS

Donor immersion trips give faithful friends of Global Mission a chance to see their gifts at work. The trips that were planned for 2020 had to be postponed, but we have recently rescheduled them for 2021. One group will travel to Indonesia in September, and another will travel to the Holy Land in October.

NEW ACADEMIC YEAR, NEW SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The fall semester of the 2020-2021 academic year began with the ELCA's seven seminaries offering their students either a hybrid of in-person and online instruction or courses conducted entirely online. The goal of each seminary was to provide the highest quality education for its students in the safest and least disruptive way possible.

For 2020, the Fund for Leaders has awarded 50 new churchwide scholarships (38 full-tuition, nine Mission Developer and three Federal Chaplaincy Ministry scholarships). For the 2020-2021 academic year, the Fund for Leaders will be assisting 297 total students with just over \$2.8 million in scholarship support.

GROWING GIFTS, GROWING ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Midway through 2020, the Fund for Leaders had received just over \$1.8 million in new gifts, which puts us 54% of the way toward our fundraising goals for the year! Our endowment fund values were negatively impacted by markets and fell during the first quarter. However, our endowment funds fared much better during the second quarter; by June 30, 2020, they had reached a combined value of over \$63.7 million. A strong finish for the year will allow the Fund for Leaders to provide continued significant scholarship support in 2021.

ONLINE EVENTS

Planning is underway for an early 2021 online event featuring a panel of Fund for Leaders alums who will talk about and reflect on ministry throughout 2020. The working title is "'For Just Such a Time As This,' A Leadership Summit." We hope this conversation will offer insights into how these alums have been leading across our church during this remarkable year. They will also share how the support of the Fund for Leaders helped enable them to lead at a time such as this. Look for more information later this year or early next year.

TWO NEW ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS **CELEBRATE THE MINISTRY OF WOMEN**

Two new endowed scholarship funds were created by generous donors this year to celebrate advances in the ministry of women in the Lutheran church. The Rev. Elizabeth A. Platz Seminary Scholarship Fund honors the 50th anniversary of Lutheran women being ordained in the United States, and the Rev. Earlean Miller Seminary Scholarship Fund celebrates the 40th anniversary of Lutheran women of color being ordained in the United States. The COVID-19 pandemic is crashing over the world in waves. Beyond the threat of the virus itself, the pandemic is causing a rise in hunger unlike anything we have seen in decades. During this time of social distancing, we are finding new ways to unite as a church and confront the rising tide of hunger. On Sept. 24, we hosted the firstever online benefit for ELCA World Hunger. Speakers included guidebook author and travel TV host Rick Steves, Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and ELCA Northwest Washington Synod Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee. Over 1,500 participants registered, making this the ELCA's largest online gathering yet.

Attendees learned about how ELCA World Hunger is responding to the current hunger crisis, as well as the ongoing root causes of hunger and poverty addressed in Steves' recent special *Hunger and Hope:* Lessons From Ethiopia and Guatemala. They also heard personal messages from ELCA World Hunger partners who are putting your gifts to work in their communities. A group of generous donors agreed

to match all gifts given in honor of the benefit up to \$250,000. Within days of the event, we met that match.

This event was part of a larger fundraising challenge for ELCA World Hunger. In recent months, a group of generous donors have contributed to a pool of challenge funds. Through this effort and others, we hope to raise an additional \$9 million by the end of the year. We believe we can combat hunger in the time of COVID-19 – but only together.

Meanwhile, your gifts are already making a difference around the world and in the United States. The 137 congregations that received \$500 Daily Bread Matching Grants in March – made possible by your gifts – are now serving their communities and garnering more support for their efforts. Together, they have raised over \$313,000, surpassing their collective fundraising goal.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response have allowed this ministry to honor our commitments to our neighbors affected by disaster. Since January 2020, Lutheran Disaster Response International has distributed over \$1.3 million to companions in 32 countries in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. With your support, our partners are meeting the immediate needs of their communities.

In Chile, the Iglesia Evangelica Luterana en Chile is distributing food and supplies to vulnerable families. It is also providing counseling to those experiencing depression, anxiety or trauma. In the Central African Republic, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic is distributing food and installing handwashing stations in public places. In Lebanon, the Contact and Resource Center is providing cash assistance to those living with disabilities who have lost their parents and are on their own. And your gifts are supporting the ACT Global Appeal, which is continuing humanitarian assistance, supporting vulnerable populations and bolstering community preparedness and resiliency around the world.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, other disasters — such as earthquakes, hurricanes and violent conflict — have continued to strike. This year, they pose even greater danger to vulnerable groups, with resources spread more thinly than ever before. Your generosity is reaching those groups in their time of greatest crisis.

In recent months, you have walked alongside communities in India and Bangladesh, where Cyclone Amphan left millions without power; in South Asia, where monsoons have driven 27,000 from their homes and into relief camps; and in Beirut, where an explosion has caused death, injury and damage as far away as six miles from its epicenter. You have also responded to tornadoes, hurricanes and wildfires that have affected communities across the United States. Your generosity has provided immediate necessities for survivors, as well as support for the long process of repairing and rebuilding their homes.

Your gifts are helping to assure your neighbors impacted by disaster that, even in the chaos of a global pandemic, they have not been forgotten. **Thank you** for your continuing dedication to this work.



ELCA WHERE NEEDED MOST



These grants support congregations and local ministries serving communities that are disproportionately at risk from the pandemic. Your gifts at work:

Grace in Action Church, Detroit, Mich.

One of the most pressing challenges facing Detroit residents during the COVID-19 crisis is access to internet service and digital technology. The Southeast Michigan Synod reports that, as schools have turned to virtual education, a high number of children and youth throughout the city lack access to home internet service and are therefore unable to participate in their classes.

A grant from the COVID-19 Response Fund has allowed Grace in Action Church to set up Wi-Fi hot spots in neighborhood parks, parking lots and schools. These hot spots are part of the church's Equitable Internet Initiative Southwest, a collaboration with the city of Detroit to increase internet access for its families.

"As people of faith, it is important for us to be clear that all people, as children of God, should have access to information and opportunity, and we need to fight against a narrative that would say it's acceptable for some people not to have that access based on where they live, how much money they have or the color of their skin," says the Rev. John Cummings, pastor of Grace in Action.

Grace in Action has set up five hot spots and is working on a sixth. To the donors who helped make this possible, Pastor Cummings says, "Especially now, the money you have donated is making a crucial difference not only in creating that access for families in southwest Detroit but [in] allowing children to continue their schooling, ensuring that they are not left behind in their education and opportunity to have a bright and successful future."
