Dear partners,

It has been two weeks since my second dose of the Pfizer vaccine. I still wear a mask everywhere I go, but I am smiling a lot more. Thank God for science.

Across the country, religious leaders are joining public health and elected officials to advocate for and advance equitable distribution of these lifesaving vaccines in the United States and globally. Through the multifaith coalition <u>Faiths4Vaccines</u>, the ELCA shares best practices and stories and receives tools to equip local leaders to play a part.

Faiths4Vaccines is effective because it galvanizes the social capital of religious communities while leveraging long-standing ecumenical and interreligious partnerships. The coalition takes a multipronged approach, recognizing that some faith communities can offer their facilities as vaccine sites while others are able to counter vaccine hesitancy as a result of racialized health disparities and abuses, while still others are equipped to advocate for equitable distribution. What unites the coalition is the shared conviction of people of faith that vaccinations will help us resume the life in community for which we were created.

The vaccine site I visited was at a local community college. After receiving each of my two doses, I was directed to a waiting area. From there, I could see the National Guard efficiently carrying out their mission and nurses acknowledging their patients' hopes and fears while administering the vaccine. Watching this holy work gave me a booster of hope in humanity. As I got up to leave, I noticed the college's mission statement on the wall: "A community with equitable opportunity for growth and success." I felt a swell of emotion. What a fitting vocation for these times.




Intersections of Spirituality, Social Justice and Climate Change
