"God's work. Our hands." Sunday is an opportunity to celebrate and proclaim who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

Save the date: Sept. 9 is "God's work. Our hands." Sunday.

Since 2013, ELCA members nationwide have gathered together for "God's work. Our hands." Sunday, sharing their gifts and faith through serving their neighbors and communities.

They have helped build and repair homes, assembled health-care kits and backpacks, distributed cookies to first responders, spent time in conversation with people in homeless shelters, prepared meals for those who are food insecure, and written letters to veterans and those currently in the military.

The Rev. Jim Culver, interim pastor of Emanuel Lutheran Church, Evansville, Ind., reflected on his experience: "I went with a group to the house of the lady with the most lawn problems. She told us, 'The Lord sent you. I don't know what I would

have done if you hadn't come to help. I grew up in another denomination and had been a member of that church all my life, but I haven't seen them lined up at my door to help me.'"

Emanuel was one of six congregations partnering with Fresh Air Community of Faith, a nondenominational church in Evansville, to work on two service projects in the community.

One group assembled more than 300 bags with toiletries, socks and snacks, which were distributed to participating congregations to hand out to homeless people. The second group worked through a neighborhood association that identified residents needing help with lawn care and home repair.

"It was a wonderful experience for us.

Some of our members now have a better understanding of our neighborhood and a vision for ministry possibilities nearby. It was also a good fellowship opportunity for our congregations to work together in a service project. I think all of us who participated are glad that we had the opportunity to work together to show the love of Jesus to people in our community," Culver said.

"God's work. Our hands." Sunday – no matter when, where or how it happens – is a rich experience of mutual care, service, learning and witness for everyone.

Mission-minded construction volunteers needed

Mission Builders is an outreach ministry of the ELCA. It provides individuals the opportunity to further the church's mission, travel, meet people, have fun, and construct buildings for camps and congregations. The volunteers do much more than swing a hammer or roll out insulation; they get involved in the site's ministry and staff, community outreach, Bible studies and local Christian service groups. They share their faith stories and invite people to get involved in the congregations and outdoor ministries where they are working.

Without Mission Builders and its volunteers, several ELCA church structures might not be constructed in the future. In 2019, Mission Builders has three times more work than it can commit to without faithful volunteers and new recruits stepping forward. In 2020, even more opportunities exist. With help from you, your men's and women's ministries, senior adult group or even your

youth group (age 14 and older, with adult supervision), new ministry spaces will be built where people can serve others in their communities, where the faith of youth and adults – of all ages and abilities – is stirred for lives of service.

The work can be physically demanding, but it is very rewarding.

This summer's construction projects that need volunteers are listed below. In some cases, lodging and meals may be available.

For individuals who have a recreational vehicle, opportunities exist for short- and long-term work commit-



ments. In a short-term stay situation, the individual receives no monetary remuneration but receives a full RV hookup while working. Longer-term commitments may involve minimum wage. Both short- and long-term workers and volunteers are covered by workers' compensation insurance.

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Big changes for the 2018 ELCA yearbook

The 2018 ELCA yearbook is now online and known as the ELCA Directory. Just as the printing press changed the world during Martin Luther's time, so the digitization of data and the internet are changing the way we publish and

access information. This directory is the beginning of that process for the ELCA. This digital online solution provides the same content as the ELCA yearbook did, with the added features of being able to access the information from any

computer (including mobile devices), filtering and annual reporting. This resource is free and can be accessed (with login) at directory.elca.org.



Practical skill-building opportunities for church musicians in 2018

The role of the church musician is varied and deep – paid or volunteer, full time or part time, band leader, choir director or organist, there are many aspects to leading music ministry. The Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM) is sponsoring workshops throughout 2018 that emphasize the central roles of the church musician and offer educational experiences on a range of topics. Most are one day. See below for the growing list of cities hosting workshops.

The ELCA and Lutheran Summer Music are partnering with ALCM to offer a longer event at Valparaiso (Ind.) University, July 23-26. This gathering will provide a rich variety of access points to effective music ministry with emphases on practical skills and the convergent, multidisciplinary concerns of the cantor's life. Presenters will share their viewpoints and experiences during short, concentrated plenary talks throughout the event. These talks will surround four blocks of two-hour group sessions in which faculty members will address the everyday concerns of ministry and give their perspectives through hands-on activities, teaching and conversation.

This extended event is designed

around the participant's needs for growing as a leader of the church's song. Sessions will cover conducting, choral leadership, keyboard leadership, handbells and hand chimes, worship-band leadership, musical styles from around the world, composition and arranging for worship, assembly song, integrating instruments, worship planning, understanding and using core worship resources and more. During the registration process, participants will be asked to evaluate their skills and identify potential areas for growth.

Valparaiso will host the event during the final week of the Lutheran Summer Music Academy and Festival, providing opportunities to learn, worship and make music together with young musicians (eighth- through 12th grades). Early registration (**before April 15**) is \$255; \$295 after that date. Registration includes several meals. Housing options include affordable on-campus, air-conditioned residence halls or hotels near the campus. Details and registration are available at alcm.org or ELCA.org/worship.

Invitation to participate: Draft ELCA interreligious policy statement

You are invited to participate in responding to the draft ELCA policy statement, "A Declaration of our Inter-Religious Commitment." From now until the end of June 2018, feedback from individuals and groups across the ELCA will be received by the task force as part of their final drafting process.

Page 5 of the statement offers tips and ideas for participating. Please consider how you might share this invitation with others and convene people to participate in the process in your networks and ministry settings.

Background of interreligious policy statement work

The 1991 ELCA Churchwide Assembly adopted "A Declaration of Ecumenical Commitment: A Policy Statement of the ELCA." This document provided

a common, theological basis and framework for our ecumenical relations. Acknowledging the distinction between seeking unity among Christians and "the responsibility of the church to enter into conversations and reach greater understanding with people of other faiths," the declaration called for a "separate, official statement to describe [the ELCA's] commitments and aspirations" for interreligious relations.

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton appointed a task force in 2016 to develop a complementary draft interreligious policy statement. The task force is chaired by Saint Paul Area Synod Bishop Patricia Lull and includes 10 members.

The draft seeks to present a common, theological basis and practical framework for this church's interreligious relations, taking into consideration our varied ministry contexts, challenges and opportunities. It is organized according to our context, vision, calling and

commitments and includes a second part that provides a robust theological foundation.

The task force will receive the feedback and input from this comment period to revise the draft before it goes to the ELCA Church Council for possible recommendation to the 2019 Churchwide Assembly. To date, the draft has been reviewed by various full communion, ecumenical and interreligious partners, as well as the Conference of Bishops' Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Liaison Committee and the board of the Lutheran Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Representatives Network.

Mission Investment Fund loan helps congregation accommodate growing ministries

Ministry has been so active at Bethlehem Lutheran in Aberdeen, S.D., that the congregation outgrew its space years ago.

“It was not uncommon for people to be sitting on the floor for our Wednesday Night Suppers – and that was with 10 to 12 extra tables set up in the narthex for overflow,” said the Rev. Jeff Whillock, Bethlehem’s pastor.

Their youth ministry was also operating out of a less-than-desirable space in a stand-alone building.

The congregation needed to expand. “Leadership planted the seed for a building addition 10 years ago,” Whillock said. Then, in the winter of 2012-13, the congregation drafted a formal plan, “Creating Room at the Table,” calling for additions radiating out from a central reception hall. The congregation went to work raising funds and chose the Mission Investment Fund (MIF), an ELCA financial ministry, as its lending partner.

MIF provides loans to ELCA congregations and ministries for building projects as well as refinancing existing debt. As a ministry of the church, MIF understands the needs and goals of congregations and ministries and helps create plans that focus on mission and



vision for the future. Its church building consultants can guide ministries through the building process. Bethlehem’s members credit MIF with being a steady partner throughout the lending and construction process.

New space opens new ministry opportunities

Bethlehem completed its expansion project in 2016. Now its fellowship hall and kitchen have sufficient space for the popular Wednesday Night Supper, which is open to the congregation and community. The expansion created a flexible fellowship space that can be divided according to needs and to host simultaneous events. The space also includes a new chapel, with sound and projection equipment, designed for baptisms, small weddings and funerals as

well as Saturday evening workshops and adult education.


The congregation also expanded its existing classroom wing for more youth ministry and lifelong learning opportunities. The new youth center has its own kitchenette and projection system, and the comfortable fireside room hosts adult ministries. These new spaces have created a more inviting place for congregation and community members to gather and grow.

Finally, Bethlehem’s expansion established the new Re-Creation Center, a large multipurpose room often used as a gym – a vital all-weather asset for all ages during South Dakota’s long and harsh winters. This large space also serves as an alternate worship space, especially for the more “creative, out-of-the-box worship services,” as Whillock calls them.

Whillock and his congregation are thrilled with their refreshed ability to respond to their growing ministries. “We have been serving this community for 133 years,” he said, “and now we can continue our work even more effectively into the future.”

Digital course on Paul reaches beyond Montana Synod

The Northern Rockies Institute of Theology (NRIT) has offered continuing education in the Montana Synod for over 35 years. Many of these classes are conducted in-person, but NRIT also offers online courses accessible to leaders everywhere, especially for rostered ministers serving in rural areas.

“St. Paul: From Saul of Tarsus to the Apostle of the Lutheran Reformation,” with Dr. James Aageson, Pauline scholar and professor emeritus at Concordia College, Moorhead, Minn., is the latest NRIT online course.

Apart from Jesus, Paul is arguably the most important figure in the history of Christianity. Paul and his legacy have shaped, fed and challenged the church from the first century to the present. His letters form the theological heart of much of the New Testament and, along with the memory of his ministry, they have continued to be read, preached, theologically interpreted and applied to contemporary ethical issues.

As we continue to observe the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, it is fitting that we revisit Paul and how he has been

interpreted and reinterpreted over the centuries and in recent times.


You can purchase this class now and watch it at your convenience. The flexible format allows you to watch in any time increment you choose, return to sections you’ve already watched or go back and forth between sessions.

The course offers four contact hours of continuing education at a cost of \$75 for rostered ministers and \$50 for pastors new to ministry (in their first three years), lay leaders and retired pastors.

Discussion and feedback on the women and justice social statement draft

“I hope that this statement reignites the Lutheran hearth fire of reformation,” said Sister Clare Josef-Maier about the upcoming social statement on women and justice. Josef-Maier is a member of the ELCA Task Force on Women and Justice: One in Christ, which is requesting public feedback on the draft



social statement released last fall. The draft is “vibrant and living, daring in its hope to engage us in speaking honestly and directly about our own jagged, raw places. ... I hope all members of the ELCA engage their process here fully,

with passion and hope and openness to one another and our world,” she said.

This spring will be a season of hearings as ELCA members study the draft – individually or in groups – and share their feedback through a response form or in person at hearings, commonly held at synod assemblies. Brad

Wendel, task force co-chair, said the group wants to know, “Did we address the most important issues? Is there anything we left out? Is the [draft] faithful to our Lutheran tradition? Does [it] equip ELCA ministries?”

Feedback is due Sept. 30. The task force will then revise the draft, taking the public input into consideration, and prepare it for a vote at the 2019 Churchwide Assembly. “These discussions are an opportunity to be the body of Christ, working together to create a social statement that will share the good news not only with the ELCA but with the world,” said Katrina Buchanan, a Lutheran Volunteer Corps member who works with the task force.


The life, witness and influence of the “Ethiopian Bonhoeffer” – Gudina Tumsa

Last fall, *Lutheran Quarterly* (lutheranquarterly.com) announced a new publishing partnership with Fortress Press. Under the editorial guidance of Paul Rorem, the Benjamin B. Warfield Professor of Medieval Church History at Princeton (N.J.) Theological Seminary, *Lutheran Quarterly* will continue to provide historical and theological scholarship to Lutheran teachers, rostered ministers, missionaries and students.

The Life, Works, and Witness of Tsehay Tolessa and Gudina Tumsa, the Ethiopian Bonhoeffer, edited by Samuel Yonas Deressa and Sarah Hinlicky Wilson, and the latest *Lutheran Quarterly* book, opens a window into the extraordinary witness of a Christian couple whose faithful life of service

earned Gudina the moniker of “Ethiopia’s Bonhoeffer.” It collects, for the first time, all of Gudina’s extant papers on holistic ministry and civil resistance, along with Tsehay’s narrative of their lives, from their childhood in Italian-occupied Ethiopia through the fall of the imperial government to the tyranny of the Derg regime. Interpretive essays frame the dramatic story, inviting Christians everywhere to reimagine what it means to carry the cross today.

“Gudina and Tsehay’s story, though largely unknown to the Western church, speaks of the power of faith, the cost



of discipleship and the extraordinary grace of God in the midst of unspeakable suffering. Their story is a model of what it means to heed Christ’s call: ‘Take up your cross and follow me,’” said Kathryn M. Schifferdecker, associate professor of Old Testament, Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minn.



Hospitality and prayer featured in Gather Bible studies

Gather, the magazine of Women of the ELCA, is featuring two thought-provoking Bible studies in its spring and summer 2018 issues.

Each May, *Gather* takes a break from multi-session Bible studies to offer a one-session devotional on an intergenerational theme. This year, the Rev. Julie A. Kanarr writes



the devotional “All are welcome.” Kanarr, pastor of Christ Lutheran Church in Belfair, Wash., helps *Gather* readers consider how groups and congregations can open their ministry to diverse newcomers. Through

examples of biblical welcome and hospitality, she also leads readers to discover ways to define themselves beyond ideas about age that can often be damaging to women. Kanarr encourages readers to define themselves as God does – through love.

The June and July/August Bible study is on prayer. Theologian Anna

Madsen of the OMG: Center for Theological Conversation (omgcenter.com) shares three sessions focused on the practice of prayer. All three can be downloaded for free.

- **Session one: The paradoxes of prayer**

(1 Samuel 12:16-23)

Readers investigate the paradoxical truths of this spiritual practice.

- **Session two: The practices of prayer** (Psalm 19:14)

Participants look at different ways to pray, what each might offer and how knowing an array of prayer styles can enrich one’s devotional life.

- **Session three: The products of prayer** (Romans 8:26-28)

Readers investigate the effects prayer can have personally, communally and on the church’s mission.






